In attendance will be; Susan Madlung –Resident Care Manager, Izabella Glinska –Social Worker, Pharmacist, Nurse Practitioner or Medical Director. We will mail you a care summary two week prior to the scheduled telephone meeting. We ask that you review the summary and bring any additional questions to this teleconference meeting.
- **Visitation.** Visitation has been up and running for a few weeks now. Most families are on to their second and third visits. We have set up a location inside and also outside in the court yard. We have received positive feedback on the initial visits. One family member commented "Visitation process was great as I had my visit this afternoon and was pleased with the process." Some other feedback received is that it is difficult for residents to hear visitors while they are wearing the mask. We understand this, but the use of mask is a provincial directive from the Provincial Medical Health Officer for visitations to occur in long term care homes.
